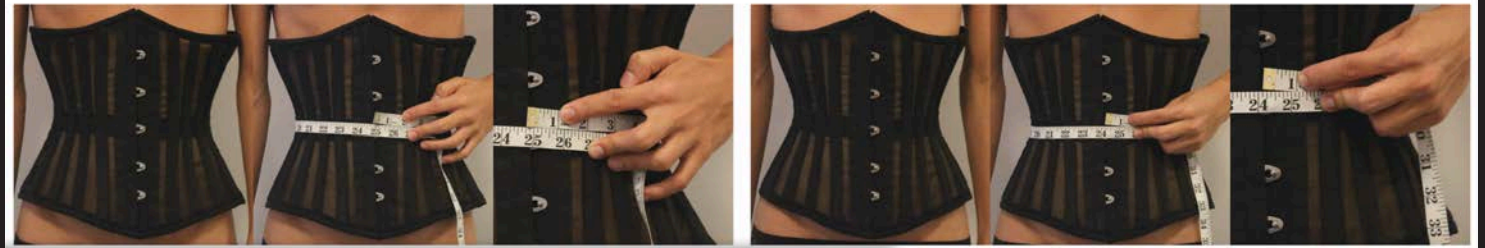

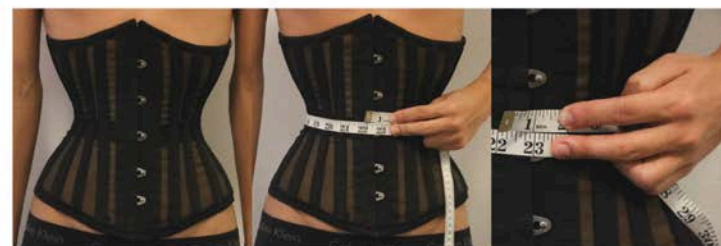

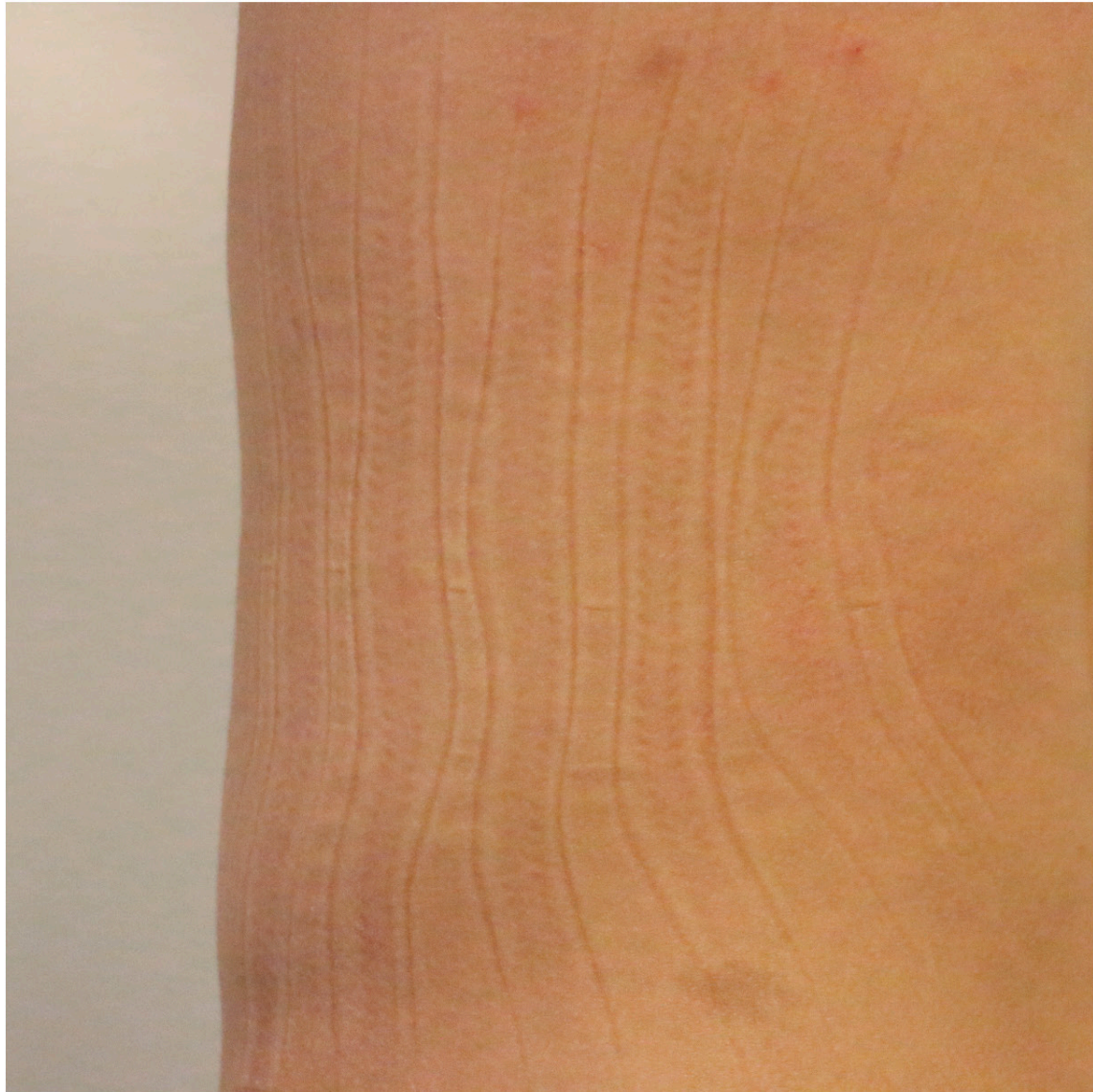

From the 1930s-1960s

Early hats with an Australian or Chinese feel had an Indian quality applied. In 1938 high crowned hats were fitted as a jaunty angle and had a flexible quality. They were small and perky and were constructed with water soluble felt.

Silhouettes introduced a Victorian revival in the form of the modern woman in 1935. The revival became a vintage revival (changing hat from femininity to masculine style). Since the revival was introduced it was also easy to enjoy and exciting and cheerful and having patterns appeared in magazines everywhere.

Over the Second World War shaped hats became less practical as people had to rush to war shelters and they would throw away anything. Men's hats became broader, deeper and through hats were not related to color. It could make the wearing discomfort. Designers produced various materials. The hat-making became extremely popular after the war ended.

1940s hats were both a continuation of the popular styles of the 1930s and the addition of novel materials. Various hats in the 1940s were a diverse collection of styles largely pulled from different parts of history.

While 1940s hats were not admired during war time they were heavily used as 25% of a luxury purchase. Good materials were scarce so many designers turned to novel decorative materials and surprising upholstery fabrics. Many hat styles continued from the 1930s but with a few exceptions, they were more masculine style.

Unlike clothing, hat colors were anything but dull. Red, orange, pink, lime green, yellow and the periodic red, white and black combinations were the norm for summer. Neutrals, dark green and black were fall time favorites. The 1940s hat was something to brighten a woman's face, show a broken heart, and give creative style to an otherwise gloom atmosphere. Hats were seen as trends because in a difficult time.

1941 an agreement was reached between the National Auctioneering and Feather Industries of America, to let the use of wild bird feathers in millinery instead from just plucked and dyed and applied to look exotic. Most 40s were made of fabric, white ribbon and costume jewelry with only one small feather added to the design. It's common to see the edge of the 40s hat.

Straw imported from Italy ceased in 1942 so designers turned to using cheap raffia or washed cotton hats. In the 40s hats were borrowed hats come in traditional felt or velvet with a smaller hat with large size hats.

Wool and diamond hat makers were used interchangeably. In summer they were made of cotton straw and formed a wide flat form with ribbon ends round. The usual wide ribbons, cones, feathers and silk added interest to these hat hats.

Large-scale hats were 1950s hit larger than bucket hats. Most of the hat but were pulled down a little further. They had a rounded top and a rounded side for that curved downward and bordered as a wide brim.

Plastic hats continued to be popular and flat styles. They were circular shaped and a low brim hat, and covered just the top of the head.

As hatmaking grew in size in the early 1960s, hat styles had to adapt to a new world of style and fashion that existed on the back of the head.

In New York, Bergdorf Goodman was known to have the best millinery department. In contrast with fashion hats were top of the line. They had a French feel. Instead of new fabrics they pulled out the hat-making knowledge from the hat-makers' past. Inspiration for the hat, designed to be worn back on the head, accommodated the new look of the hat. With a variety of styles, they got into business the year around business, catering to millinery industry and was successful known in ladies' signature hat.

As hatmakers of the mid 1960s were geared for profit, which were hats springing, hatmakers became an accessory of the past. With the acquisition of hats makers were, the hatmakers hat got disappeared in the 1970s.

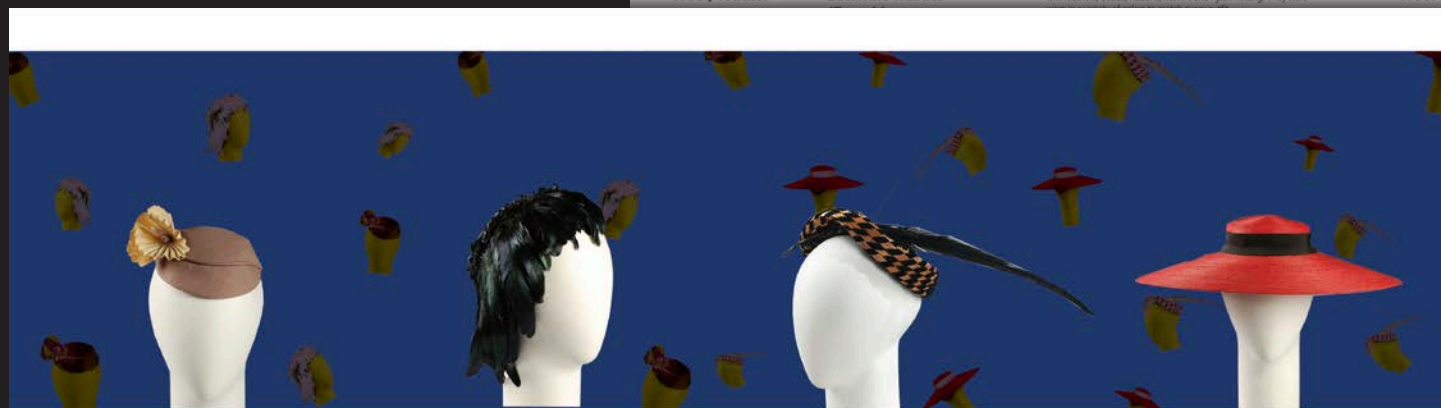

As hairstyles grew in size in the early 1960s, hat styles had to adapt. In vogue were tiny poufs of veil or pillboxes that perched on the back of the head.

In New York, Bergdorf Goodman was known to have the best millinery department; its custom-made Halston hats were top of the line. Roy Halston Frowick created the now-famous deep pillbox hat that Jacqueline Kennedy wore to her husband's 1961 inauguration. The hat, designed to be worn back on the head, accommodated the First Lady's bouffant hairstyle. Within months, the pill-box became the rage across America, boosting the millinery industry, and was thereafter known as Jackie's signature hat.

As fashions of the mid 1960s were geared for youth, which wore hats sparingly, headwear became an accessory of the past. With the exception of cold weather wear, the fashion hat all but disappeared in the 1970s.

Perky hats with an Austrian or Cossack feel had an outdoor sporty appeal. In 1935 high-crowned hats were tilted at a jaunty angle and had a flirtatious quality. They were small and pert and were contrasted with wider sailor style hats.

Schiaparelli introduced a Victorian revival in the form of the modern snood in 1935. The snood became a mainstay method of keeping hair free from machinery in wartime Britain. Since the snood was crocheted it was also easy to copy and knitting and crochet and tatting patterns appeared in magazines everywhere.

Once the Second World War started hats became less practical as people had to rush to air raid shelters and they would literally drop everything. Barriers of etiquette became broken down and although hats were not rationed in order to boost morale their wearing decreased. Designers produced various new styles, but many only became universally popular after the war finished.
